1950s

The decade was challenging for female foreign correspondents with the aftermath of World War II and the beginning of the Korean War. Theta Sig President Margaret Withrop calls for a global view “to improve communications among ourselves, our immediate neighbors, our fellow Americans, and humans across the world,” the AWC goal for the 1950s.

Back home, Theta Sigma Phi adopts the Hospitalized Veterans Writing Project to teach veterans in local hospitals how to write, awarding cash prizes for their efforts. The program is an AWC national service project for the next 20 years.

With 88 members living abroad, AWC expands internationally, forming Theta Sigma Phi Internationale. Articles featured in *The Matrix* focus on members living and working abroad.

Theta Sigma Phi celebrates its golden anniversary at the University of Washington State in Seattle, where the organization began. Attendees meet founding members Blanche Brace, Irene Somerville, and Georgina MacDougall Davis, who pass the torch of leadership on to the next generation. “From your strength and progress will come our greatest honor.”

Theta Sigma Phi continues to identify new job opportunities for members and initiates the Talent Sparks Program to recruit promising high school students for communications careers.

AWC Convention delegates learn what the space age can bring to journalism with computer typesetting and news transmission via satellites.

1968

Members choose “Facing the Issues” as an annual meeting theme to address growing racial unrest. *The Matrix* publishes “Negro News—Why Isn’t More on Women’s Pages” by Theta Sig Ponchitta Pierce, editor of *Ebony* Magazine.

The Vietnam War, another tumultuous issue of the decade, affects members. Esther Van Wagoner Tufty covers the turmoil as a correspondent, and Natalie Best becomes the first female war correspondent for a television station.

The decade begins with more “firsts” by members: Science writer Jean Pearson becomes the first female reporter to go to the South Pole. Helen Thomas, White House correspondent for United Press International, is the only female print reporter to accompany President Nixon on his landmark trip to China.

Members discover that the organization’s Greek letters limit their acceptance as a professional organization. Conference delegates vote to change the name to Women in Communications, Inc. (WICI). Founding members approve the change, since “the original concepts for the society held strong and true.” Members also vote to admit men as full-time members rather than honorary members.

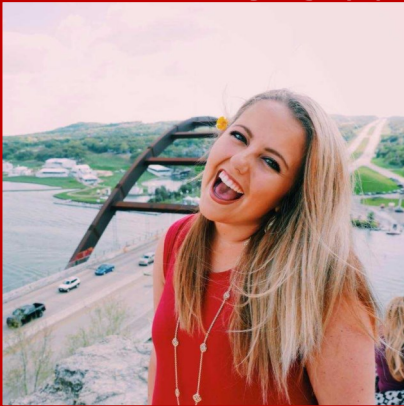
WICI establishes the National Awards Program, designed to recognize excellence in all areas of communications, to provide an incentive for further achievement, and to demonstrate the role of communications in dealing with current issues. The program is renamed the Clarion Awards in 1974.

Women’s rights emerge as the biggest challenge of the decade. Recent laws lead businesses to hire men and women on an equal basis, but women are not promoted at the same rate as men. WICI throws its support behind the struggle to pass the Equal Rights Amendment. In partnership with 11 other organizations, WICI founds the First Amendment Congress, which works to preserve First Amendment Rights.

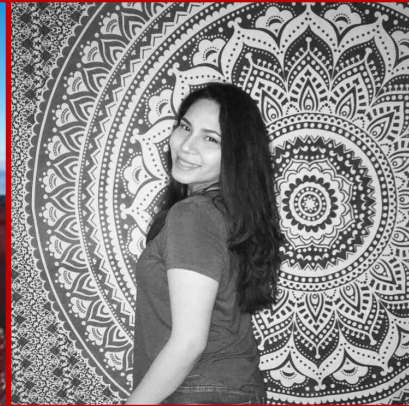
